They join the existing members in bringing their professional and personal talents to address the issues of homelessness and provide strategic guidance, financial leadership, and to uphold the values of The Lord's Place.

Rob Indresano

With 25 years of staffing industry experience, Rob Indresano led Barton Associates as President and COO from 2007-2022 and as CEO from 2022-2025. Indresano transitioned from the CEO role to Chairman of the Board at the end of January 2025. Under his leadership, Barton Associates grew organically to become the fourth largest locum tenens staffing company in the nation. Indresano earned a B.A. in Economics from Boston College, an M.B.A. from Suffolk University, and a J.D. from Georgetown University Law Center.

Indresano and his wife, Tara, raised their children north of Boston in Lynnfield, MA, and now reside in Jupiter, FL.

His involvement with TLP includes serving as an employment services volunteer where he assists with conducting mock interviews to prepare clients for job interviews. Indresano also chairs both the Housing and Facilities Committee and the IT Committee and is a member of the Social Impact and Innovation Committee.

Bryna Rogers works remotely from her Palm Beach home as a Senior Director at Bay State Community Services in Quincy, MA, where she oversees program implementation, compliance, and start-up support for staff. During her 15-year tenure at BSCS, she has launched and led several programs and now serves on the agency's senior leadership team.

Throughout her career in social services, Rogers has specialized in supporting youth who have experienced childhood trauma and working with families involved in the juvenile justice system and the Department of Children and Families.

Prior to her current position, Rogers spent more than 15 years working directly with youth in school, home, and therapeutic settings. She has also served on a variety of nonprofit boards, including as vice president of the DCF Advisory Board on Boston's South Shore.

When not working, Rogers enjoys spending time with her husband, the Rev. Tim Schenck, Rector of the Church of Bethesda-by-the-Sea in Palm Beach. They raised their two boys on Boston's South Shore in Hingham, MA, and reside in Palm Beach, FL.

For the past four years, Rogers has supported TLP's past social enterprises and attended the annual Ending Homelessness Breakfast each November. She serves on the agency's Social Impact and Innovation Committee.

According to Rogers, "We have a moral and spiritual mandate to respect the dignity of every human being. No one should be unhoused, and we all have an obligation to help end homelessness both in our community and beyond."
